OBITUARY



G.R. Cramond, M.A. Hons. (Otago), Dip. Ed.St., Dip. Tchg. 1932-2020

Principal 1980 - 17 July, 1991

It was with sadness that the School noted the passing, on Saturday, 18 July, 2020 - exactly twenty-nine years after his retirement - of its immediate past and only surviving former Principal, Mr. G.R. Cramond. He died peacefully at Tauranga surrounded by his family in his 88th year.

In my official history of the School, Rotorua's Plume: A History of Rotorua Boys' High School, 1880-2001, I wrote the following about him:

"Of the School's [eleven] Principals since 1914, Cramond is the only one to have come to the position with prior experience as a Principal of a large single-sex boys' school. As the former Principal of one of New Zealand's oldest and most traditional of state boys' schools [New Plymouth Boys' High School], he came to Rotorua Boys' High School with just the right sort of background and experience that was needed to guide it through the next phase of its history.

The School's fifth Principal, Geoffrey (Geoff) Cramond, brought many qualities to the position. In many ways he was an amalgam of the best qualities of all four of his immediate predecessors. Like Harwood, he was a man of scholarship, contemplation and a first-rate administrator. In his cheerful and naturally tolerant disposition he was similar to Thornton, while in strength of character and resolution of purpose he was much more like Hamill. In common with Ryder, he had the rare quality of natural dignity and a real 'presence' about him which inspired deep respect, admiration and commanded deep loyalty. He was very much a product of the "old school" and this background contributed to make him the fine teacher and Principal that he was."

I wrote that in the late-1990s. I do not feel, some twenty-two years later, that a more fitting summation of Mr. Cramond's character can be made. He was the Principal in my time, so I had as good a chance as any boy did to observe him during my five years at the School. Although he was certainly a remote figure to us boys and he was only ever seen from a distance usually at assemblies on the stage in his academic gown, he was certainly a man that I, and I'm sure that most boys, looked up to and admired.

He definitely had a presence about him, and his pride and trust in the School and his boys was unquestioned. Many boys, including myself, noticed that he always parked his car outside A Block unlocked with the key left in the ignition. On many occasions boys, that were brave enough to, opened his car, removed the key from the ignition and took it straight in to his secretary worried that he had left them in the car by mistake. The next day his car would be sitting outside A Block again unlocked and with the key in the ignition! I think everyone just instinctively knew that there was no need for Mr. Cramond to lock his car at school.

On behalf of all of my fellow Old Boys from the 1980 to mid-1991 years of his tenure at Rotorua Boys' High School, I wish to extend my condolences to the Cramond family on the death of their beloved father and grandfather.

I am mindful that Mr. Cramond's Master of Arts degree from the University of Otago was conferred on him, in 1954, with First-Class Honours in Latin. I can think of no better or more appropriate way to end than to say:

Ad Astra Per Aspera, Mr. Cramond.



Property Developments

I am pleased to advise that further progress has been made in the planning for our new Science Faculty and we have been advised that construction is scheduled to start in December this year. Similarly with the Grandstand / Field Seating area we are waiting on Council Consent to allow the construction phase to get underway. Given that our home games have finished for our Rugby 1st XV we expect work to commence on the site almost immediately.

A further project that is in the planning stages and likely to be started this year is the replacement of the roof in the Millennium Centre given there have been some issues in that block around water tightness.

These projects in total add up to approximately \$8 million and certainly will represent significant enhancements of our school environment.




Figure 3: Comparative distribution indicating the attainment rate of NCEA Level 2 or above for male school leavers at each school from 2012 to 2018. Plots depict between 395 (2012) and 419 (2017) co-educational and 49 single-sex schools for each year.

Preliminary Examinations

Preliminary Exams are used to prepare students for their end of year external exams. These exams will inform teachers about what further work is needed to benefit students having a fair and reasonable opportunity to achieve in the external exams later in the year. The preliminary exams are also an official result that can be used for a Derived Grade for an External Exam. A Derived Grade application can be presented to NZQA by Mr Buckton if you have a circumstance that meets the criteria during the time of the exam or leading up to the exam that may result in not attending or impairing a result. It is expected that students prepare well and attend all their preliminary and external examinations.

Exam Conditions

1. Attend exams in correct school uniform
2. Be seated 20 minutes before the exam commences
3. Phones and electronic devices must be switched off and left in front of room / hall
4. Must not communicate with any other student during the exam
5. Follow all instructions given by the supervisor
6. Water in a clear bottle is allowed, however, no food is to be brought into the exam room
7. Cannot leave in the first 60 minutes and last 15 minutes

Our students in Years 10, 11 and 12 have recently completed their subject selections for next year. Towards the end of Term 3 and at the beginning of Term 4 these students will be having conversations with their Deans to ensure the timetables that have been created are suitable for each individual student's pathway. As whānau it is important you play a part in this conversation, so that you are informed and are able to support your young men with their future pathways.

We are continuing to offer several new and improved courses in the senior school in 2021, such as a refined Level 2 Outdoor Education, Level 3 Sport Studies, Level 2 Pasifika Studies, Level 3 Business Studies and a modified course in Level 3 English to support all of our students..

As well as thinking about endorsements, UE Literacy is also an advantage to have especially if your son is not planning on completing NCEA Level 3. This shows a level of Literacy skill that a lot of positions are looking for.

Not the best year so far?

Need some help to catch up or a bit of support to help you reach those endorsement grades...

Your son can attend Te Honoa Toi on a Monday through to Thursday afternoon in the Library from 3pm till 4pm. We have a Mathematics and English specialist available and if you would like support specifically from your teacher or in another subject area, have a conversation with them to create a game plan.

Subject Selection for 2020 and Prerequisites

Your son should have completed his subject selection for 2020, if he does not complete this selection in a timely fashion he may find himself left out of his desired courses for 2020. Take time to discuss his options with him and make contact with teachers or House Group teachers if you would like any extra clarification.

Please note that a lot of the courses have prerequisites- conditions that need to be met to be able to take the class. It is expected that for a student to take a Level 3 class, they will need to have passed that class in Level 2 if they are taking it. A minimum of 12 credits at Level 2 in that class will be required.




Traffic Light Update

The focus for some of these boys is to continue to work towards gaining either their University Entrance in their approved subjects, along with attaining their University Entrance Literacy requirements or aiming for an endorsement. The remaining students are tracking well towards gaining their NCEA Level 3 Certificate.

A reminder, due to Covid-19, the benchmarks for this year have been altered and therefore students require 52 credits to now attain their NCEA Level 3. They also need to attain 46 or more credits at Excellence if they wish to endorse their certificate with Excellence and 46 or more Merit or Excellence credits if they wish to endorse their certificate with Merit. This has led to the adjustment of the traffic light cut-offs below.







On Saturday the 22nd August the 2020 1st XV added to our schools rugby legacy by winning the prestigious Moascar cup for only the 2nd time in our schools history. Our last successful challenge was in 2003 in the national final also against Napier BHS. The trophy is a very unique cup with its origins in London, England 1904. Somehow the trophy made its way to Cairo Egypt between then and 1918. The cup made of solid sterling silver was purchased by the competition organising committee of the British expeditionary forces who had 10 divisions camped in Ismailia, a city in North-easten Egypt. The committee thought it best to keep the soldiers occupied through sport so created a rugby competition that included 6 British teams, 3 Australia and 1 New Zealand Division. The name Moascar was thought to come from a small village nearby where the troops were stationed when in actual fact Moascar means camp in Arabic. So the camp cup, but Moascar sounds better. To make it appropriate to the occasion the trophy was mounted on a center part of a sawn off propeller off a german plane shot down near Egypt. It certainly made the trophy valuable more so as the years passed on.

The New Zealand Mounted Rifle Brigade won the tournament with a record of 9 wins and 1 draw. It was a fiercely contested competition. The desire to keep this trophy relevant meant it was presented to the NZRFU for the good of rugby. Because junior rugby had suffered through the war it was decided to donate it to school 1st XV rugby in a knockout tournament between the North and South Island to decide the best school in the country. Over the years for various reasons the trophy has been lost, forgotten about and even a victim of theft...the original german propeller was stolen and replaced with another.

A Lot of stars have to align for us to win this trophy often referred to as the Ranfurly shield of and symbol of school boy supremacy. In fact only 39 school 1st XVs have ever held the Moascar cup and only the 2nd time Rotorua Boys have held the trophy, previously in 2003 and 2004. The trophy has seen a major revival in the last 30 years with the NZRFU making several rule changes to ensure the trophy is not forgotten about and protected by schools. It needs to be put up for home games and/ or a mandatory 7 challenges a year, with one challenge from a team outside of your region. Our first challenge for the trophy is against Palmerston North Boys High School who have held the trophy numerous times over its one hundred year history in New Zealand Schools Rugby. If we are successful in this challenge we will face Hastings BHS on the 12th of September.
